making rulings where necessary, correcting scoring errors on the bridgemates, finalising the scores at the end of play, posting results on the noticeboard and the internet, collecting and packing away the bridgemates, collecting boards and placing them ready for re-dealing.

This work is completely voluntary. All players should assist the director where they can particularly by returning bridgemates and boards to a collection point at the end of play. Thanking the session director is a matter of common courtesy.



#### **ANNOUNCING THE ANNOUNCEMENTS**

### **Laurie Kelso**

As of August 1<sup>st</sup> 2013 there will be a significant change to the current alerting procedures which will have an impact on all players.

When you open 1. or a natural 1NT, there will be no need to alert the bid. Instead opener's partner must automatically "announce", without waiting to be asked, the essential meaning of the bid.

For a natural 1NT opening, this announcement is the strength range. So partner says: "15 to 17" or "12 to 14" or whatever the range is.

For a 14 opening, it depends on the system. For natural systems, partner announces the minimum club length guaranteed, saying "4 plus clubs" or "3 plus clubs", etc.

For strong club systems, you announce the point range. In Precision you would say "strong at least 16 points".

For other systems, for example Polish Club, which has multiple meanings for the 1. opening, partner simply announces "unusual".

After any announcement, the opponents will still be able to ask supplementary questions, however the basic information already conveyed will avoid much of that need. A side benefit of this new approach is that many of the problems currently created due to inopportune (and sometimes pointed) enquiries will now disappear. And opponents will no longer be at risk of confusion caused by variable 1NT ranges and the like.

Announcements have been successfully used in both England and the United States for a number of years and it is felt that the above application of the same approach will also be beneficial in Australia.

Answers to a couple of follow-up questions are below.

Question - Can you advise what happens behind screens - is announcing compulsory?

Behind screens things are different (including the application of some Laws).

With screens everything is theoretically alertable - from 1C up to 7NT, plus also cue bids and doubles etc.

There are no 'announcements' nor any 'self-alerting calls' - in fact no verbal communication at all!

# My Favourite Hands (on BBO) Alan Boyce

### Sometimes Silence can be Golden -

Given my current predicament of working overseas, in the middle of the Central Pacific, and only getting home for a week at a time, bridge outings are rather few and far between. BBO is my only solace and even that is fraught with danger, what with the very slow internet speeds and the propensity for power to be lost every other day.

So it was on BBO I found myself recently with this little beauty, sitting North 4<sup>th</sup> in hand, at imps, with E-W vulnerable.

I heard the bidding start:



East, the dealer, opened 1C, partner overcalled 1H, west bid 1S, and I pondered how many points were in this deck? Everyone has spoken and I've got a hand I'd open in any seat, given the nice intermediaries. (18 banzai points, plus working 9's and 8's according to Klinger's "Better Balanced Bidding".)

But I digress, what would you bid in my spot? Poor doubleton heart is hardly the support to raise partner, surely NT bid by me now says I've got

both opponents suits stopped, and yet can a pass be right? I decided that I'd keep "mum" at this stage but be prepared to act if partner is willing to bid again.

Bidding continued as (original bids repeated for convenience):

```
W N E S
1C 1H
1S P 2S 3H! (Now I shall act)
3S 4H 4S P
```

Back to me. No problems raising 3H to 4 for me on the last round but the bidding had continued. Given partner had been willing to bid to 3H without any words from me, we should surely have a number of tricks outside of spades so I double and remarkably east decides to redouble, surely on the basis that he doesn't believe my double given my earlier silence.

The full hands were:

In retrospect East was clearly deceived by West's willingness to bid twice on that hand but still 4S is a real st-r-e-t-c-h on that bidding, even s-t-r-e-t-c-h-i-n-g for the vulnerable game bonus. Play went:

North's lead – 9H 10H QH 5H South's lead – 7C 3C QC 4C

North's lead – 2H JH AH 8H (3<sup>rd</sup> heart now and this gives Declarer a big guess and a trump promotion for me, but alas..)

South's lead – AS 2S 8S 3S South's lead – 3D 2D AD 7D I now try belatedly for a club ruff North's lead – 2C 6C 3H 10C



E-W now claimed for 2-off vulnerable, redoubled, for 1000. Best defence would see a score of 1600. Now, do I rate the bidding as perfect? Certainly not. East's 12 count, balanced and aceless, is questionable, 1H-3H by south is questionable with only 10 HCP's, but great shape encouraged the 2<sup>nd</sup> bid; West finding 2 bids with 5 HCP's and ordinary shape was asking for trouble, and East bidding 3 times in the auction with a hand that was still an ordinary 12 count was just too bad for words. Not to mention deciding to redouble with the same boring 12 count! What I did learn on that hand, (and I've seen this type of advice repeated in a number of books by

William Roots) if an initial bid seems wrong, and my 1<sup>st</sup> chance to speak presented me with that very dilemma, perhaps an initial pass just might be right, and even present a big piece of rope for the opponents to commit bridge suicide with!

See you all in October in Sydney if I don't see you beforehand!



# Crossrufffing is fun - Dawn Cullen



Bidding to 6 hearts on this hand is not easy but making 12 tricks will still produce a good score.

The trump suit is very strong so a crossruff should work. The first ruff in each hand must be done with a small trump but then a high crossruff will produce 12 tricks.

On the lead of the QS win the K and cash the ace. Now lead 4 diamonds. If a trump is returned the trick can be won in the south hand and a crossruff started. It is important to cash the two top clubs first and then proceed to crossruff diamonds and clubs to make 8 trump tricks as well as the two top spades and the two top clubs for 12

I always think the looks on the faces of the opponents as they eventually have to under-ruff are priceless.
